To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the U.S. entry into the war, join HSP and Warrior Writers for a workshop as local veterans share the words of their counterparts in "The Great War," as well as their own experiences.



Attendees will then be divided into small groups, and will have a safe, comfortable environment to share reactions and thoughts in relation to what was read and said. They'll be encouraged to express themselves in various forms, such as poetry, spoken word, limericks, haikus, or drawing.
